## **Black History in the World of Swimming**

Ft. Lauderdale is the home of the International Swimming Hall of Fame (ISHOF). I honestly did not know that prior to going to Ft. Lauderdale but one afternoon while on a sightseeing boat ride we passed by the Ft. Lauderdale Aquatic complex.



The ISHOF is a part of the Ft. Lauderdale Aquatic Complex and on this particular day they were hosting the YMCA National Short Course Championships. Oh goody! A swim meet - during spring break ! By the time the sightseeing boat ride ended the meet was ending so we missed the excitement. But being the history buff that I am – and to add a little "education" to Spring Break - we went over to the International Swimming Hall of Fame to see what we could find. After paying a small admission fee (\$8 for adults, \$4 for students) we entered the Museum. At the time there were many exhibits housed at the museum but the one that caught Kai's attention contained the history of Olympic swimsuits and swim attire from around the world. Bruce Wigo, CEO of the ISHOF, was there that day and took the time to walk us through the exhibit and he patiently entertained all of my questions about how we can get the historical information about African Americans and Swimming out to the masses.
